In the second quarter, the number of people choosing new health insurance plans was down, on average, by 4.4 percent. In total, about 6 million people decided to stay with their current plans. The details behind the story: When President Barack Obama signed the Affordable Care Act into law last year, experts predicted that the country's uninsured rate would drop by as much as 20 percent. The actual result? In the three years since Obamacare's tax credits were implemented, the uninsured rate has been cut by only 7 percent. That's much less than what was hoped for, and nowhere near the 20 percent goal. The results: The Affordable Care Act was supposed to provide more insurance for the uninsured. So the idea was that people would end up choosing more comprehensive coverage that would cost less than paying for a bare-bones policy. That hasn't happened. Among the policy's chief goals: Enroll more people into the private insurance exchanges and cut out-of-pocket health costs. But just how successful those goals have been isn't clear. The details: With all the coverage controversies swirling around Obamacare, some of the most crucial questions are about how the health law is working. Obamacare's gains have been modest, especially compared to some of the law's supporters' predictions. The questions: Big news for Obamacare supporters: The U.S. health care system costs the government more money than it's supposed to. The national health insurance program for the poor, Medicaid, is actually costing the federal government about \$1 trillion more than it was supposed to. As a result, the federal government has decided to go back to the drawing board, slashing Medicaid spending to the bone. The details: The Obama administration has decided that another 1,700 IRS agents will have to give up their government jobs. That's the most expected personnel cutbacks of any of the government's divisions. It's

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
